Our Lady of Good Hope Program Gives Two ESL Students A Chance to Thrive.

Teaching ESL students provides a different challenge than teaching native English speakers. These students have different learning requirements, especially when it comes to English and literature. The following is an interview with a homeschool mom, Anna Maria, who has two ESL students at home.

Introduction:

When Anna Maria adopted two Ethiopian highschoolers, she was determined to give them the best education possible with their limited English skills. Since they came from a foreign country where English is spoken as a second language, they need extra flexibility in their English program to facilitate their language development. Anna Maria also has two other younger children who need her time and attention to stay on top of learning. Challenges:
